SHELTON ANNOUNCES NEW BASKETBALL TEAM AND COACH

John Mark Cornelius has been named the new head basketball coach for Shelton State Community college, according to college president Tom Umphrey.

As coach of the Shelton Buccaneers, Cornelius will lead the team in their first season of play as part of the Alabama Junior College Conference.

Shelton will be part of the central division of the league and will play teams such as Jefferson State Community College, Southern Union Junior College, Wallace Community College at Selma, Chattahoochee Valley Community College.

For the past two seasons, Cornelius has served as a graduate assistant for Wimp Sanderson and the University of Alabama Crimson Tide Basketball. Part of his duties with the University included scouting, on-campus recruiting, film exchange, and working with the players during practice.

From 1986-1988, Cornelius served as head varsity basketball coach for Altamont School in Birmingham where his teams compiled a 36-12 record and were named area champions.

Cornelius played college basketball at the University of Montevallo, where he received a Bachelor of Science Degree in 1986.

Majoring in adult fitness, he will complete his Master of Arts Degree from the University of Alabama this August.

SHELTON INSTRUCTOR QUALIFIES FOR NATIONAL TRIATHLON

TUSCALOOSA Milady Khoury-Murphy, instructor of wellness for Shelton State Community College, was named a qualifier this week-end for national triathlon competition. Competing in the Bud Lite Triathlon tournament in La Grange, Georgia, Ms. Khoury-Murphy placed fourth out of 150 participants in her age group.

The top five winners in each age group will travel to Las Vegas, Nevada, in October to compete on a national level. Approximately, 5,000 participants are expected to compete this year in the national tournament.

The triathlon competition requires each participant to swim one-half mile, bicycle 25 miles, and run 5.2 miles.

SHELTON STATE COMMUNITY COLLEGE HONORS OUTSTANDING STUDENTS

Terence A. Mozena of Northport was named the 1990 recipient of the Leo Sumner Award, the highest award given by Shelton State Community College. This award, which was named in honor of the college's first president, Leo Sumner, is given each year to the sophomore at the college who has distinguished himself/herself academically and given the most to the college and the community.

Lake Alan Bush received the Jim Allen award which is awarded annually at each of the two-year colleges in the state. Bush is a student in the machine technology program at the college. He is from Fayette, Alabama, and a graduate of Fayette County High School where he was a member of the National Honor Society. Bush graduated with an advanced diploma.

The Shelton State Foundation established two Presidential Scholarships this year named in honor of Shelton president, Tom Umphrey. Receiving those scholarships are Martha Jones and Willie A. Peebles. The Foundation also awarded the Abner P. Neil Environmental Scholarship to Linda Harbison, a student in the cosmetology department. This scholarship, established this year by the Neil Corporation and Aveda Corporation, is awarded each year to a Shelton student majoring in esthetics of skin care.

The Belinda Hughes Memorial Scholarship was also awarded by the Foundation to Kimberly Holmes. This scholarship was established by the Shelton State support staff in honor of Belinda Hughes, a co-worker now deceased.

The University of Alabama awarded several scholarships to Shelton students. Angela Holcomb and Anne Jones received University of Alabama Alumni Junior College Scholarships and Brian Davis received an Engineering Scholarship from the University. Monica Fields was named the recipient of an University of Alabama Junior College Honors Scholarship and Angela Holcomb received the Elizabeth Coleman Honors Scholarship.

C., received the Outstanding Community Leadership Award. Mr. Ray serves as secretary/treasurer of the Shelton State Foundation. Roland Pugh, president of Roland Pugh Construction Company, was recognized as the college's Outstanding Alumni.

Shelton also recognized the two students who represented the college in the Outstanding Community College Students competition sponsored by the Alabama Deans of Students Association. Gwendolyn Wade and Virgil King represented the college in Montgomery this week in the competition.
